- Clean
- Clean contaminated: a wound involving normal but colonized tissue
- Contaminated: a wound containing foreign or infected material
- Infected: a wound with pus present.

• Close clean wounds immediately to allow healing by primary intention

• Do not close contaminated and infected wounds, but leave them open to heal by secondary intention

Wound Management - WHO The key to effective wound management lies in the identification and optimisation of factors that could potentially delay the normal wound healing process and is therefore not just the act of applying a dressing. There is no dressing that can compensate for an undiagnosed and untreated pathologic condition (Bolton 1990).
